German defences along the 450 mile western from are crumblin under the assaults of seven Allied armadies, numbering almost 5,000 000 troops. The Ganadian Army latest Allied Army to enter the battle, is now advancing against strong opposition in Holland.

The Nazis show signs of cracking up on the First A-rmy front where six towns fell to the advancing American forces led by tanks and tank edstroyers. The German's have flooded the lowlands here in an attempt to stall the American offensive.

General Patch's 7th U.S. Army continues to grind forward and at one point re 12 miles beyond Strasburg from the Bavarian border.

General Patton's third U.S. Army is closing in on the important Geona city of Saarbrucken. To the south French 1st Army forces in continued advances yesterday cut off thousands of Germans between Mohaus and Belfor.

On the Eastern front Eussian forces have expanded their breakthrough southwest of Budapest to 50 mile. Yesterday Red Army troops swept 20 miles forward and captured the town of Pecs, a coal mining center. RHAWKS AND THUNDERBOLTS SINK JAP CONVOY

General MacArthur's communique announced the destruction of another Japanese convoy enroute to Leyte. Warhawks and Thunderbolts, escorted by Lightning Fighters, sank the 6 ship supply and troop convoy on Wednesday evening and Thursday morning dive bembers attack. An estimated 5000 enemy troops were drowned. Six enemy escort planes were shot down, we lost two planes.

A continual downpour of raim which washed out bridges & roads limited action on Leyte to patrol activity.

American naval units after bombarding Japanese installations on Ormoc sunk an enemy submarize in Ormoc Bay.

Tuesday and Wednesday enemy airfields in the Visayans were blasted with 93 tons of bombs. Liberator and Lightnings attacked Jap airfields on Negros. Liberator bombers cratered enemy airfields with 24 tons of bombs.

Off the north coast of Borneo Mitchell bombers on Wednesday morning sank a small freighter and one harge and damaged a large vessel.

Tuesday our night fighters shot down one enemy raidir lane over Morotai.

Dutch B-25's sank a small freighter off Timor and blasted enemy installations in Aroe Islands. Wednesday enemy installations on Wewak were heavily hit with 21 tons of bombs. Two bridges, a convoy of 13 trucks and bibouac areas were destroyed in a 35 ton bomb raid on New Ireland.

CHINA:— In southwest China the Japanese advancing in to Kweichow province continues. Japanese have outflanked Kweilung adding to the gravity of the Chinese situation in the Kwangsi-Kweichow area.

Burma: - The Japanese are withdrawing on all fronts.
